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Overlapping Calls

Overlapping calls are two or more calls occurring at the same time before the Duty Crew can respond to it. For instance, the Duty Crew could be responding to, arriving at, or at the scene of an incident when another call for service comes in. In 2022 we had an overlapping average of about 13.8% (as compared to 15.8% in 2021 and 11.9% in 2020). In April we had 5 overlapping calls for a total of 14.29% of our calls. This year our overlapping average 7% (9 of 127).

Call Staffing:

This chart provides the duty crew staffing levels for the number of incidents. Our minimum is two (at least one Paramedic). Two calls involved the response of off-duty/paid-on-call staff.

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Vehicle Repair & Maintenance:

Several vehicles obtained their required Michigan Department of Transportation (DOT) inspections. During the inspections some repairs/maintenance had to be performed to meet the standards of the inspection. No significant, out of the ordinary, costs were acquired.

Fire Prevention/Community Risk Reduction:

 Made conditional offer to a candidate. He'd like to shore up a couple of things that he had planned for the summer and start in August or September. We agreed.

Miscellaneous Things Involving Our Department:

- Responded to several grass fires leading up to and during red flag days. Those calls were in the Cedar or Empire areas.
- Shift trainings continued this month. Every month each shift (red, green, and blue) comes up with a training topic and outline for the other shifts to train on too. The topic can be anything related to the types of calls we may respond to (fire, EMS, haz-mat, or rescue) and is designed to be 30-60 minutes in length and achievable by a crew of two or three.
- Captain Russell Korson and Chief Besson attended the Fire Department Instructors
 Conference in Indianapolis, IN. Captain Korson went for a week and took on a heavy class
 load.
- Made a conditional offer to a candidate for the vacant ninth full-time Duty Crew position.
 The position was accepted by Firefighter/EMT and Hazardous Materials Technician Tate
 Hall. Tate is from the Fenton Area and will begin his career as a full-time firefighter/EMT on May 8th.
- Attended a large-scale water shuttle and fire suppression training in Suttons Bay. The class
 was put together by personnel of the Traverse City Fire Department and was attended by
 Firefighter Greg Johnson, Firefighter Randy Rosselle, Firefighter James Howard, and

- Learned that Firefighter Sasha Moore completed all of the necessary examinations to obtain her State of Michigan Paramedic License. This was a long journey, and we are proud of her for staying focused!
