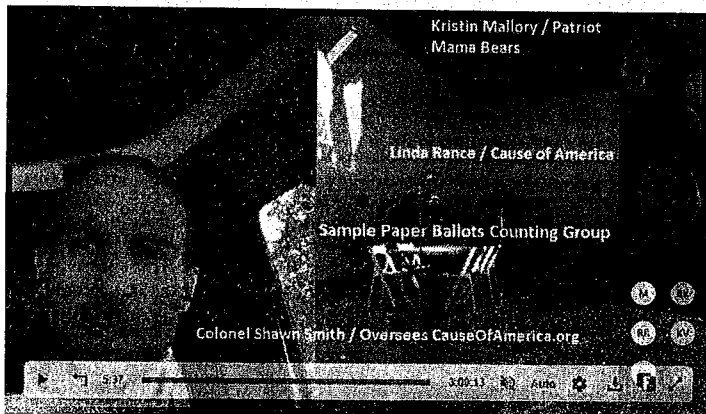

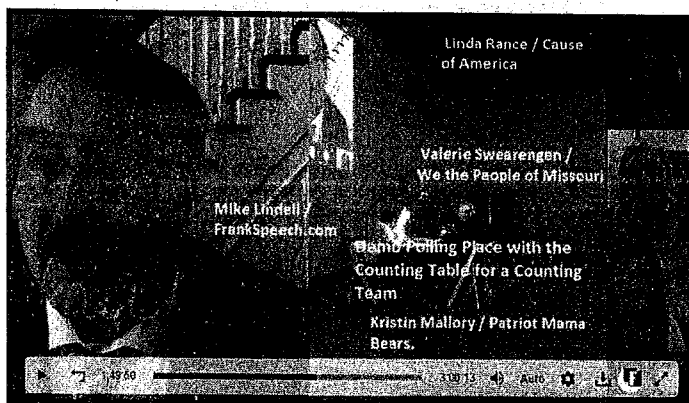

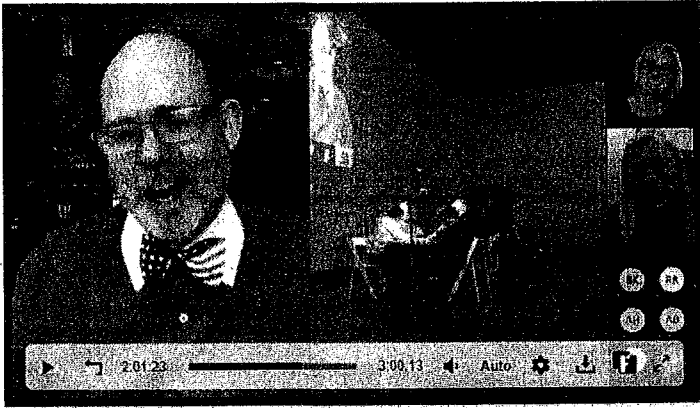

But what I do know and I know better than anybody who hasn't had the opportunities I've had is the threat themselves the threat itself, particularly from foreign nation states, but from very capable, advanced persistent threat actors and teams, and the threat to cyber and computer systems is more severe and more fantastic in scope than most people are aware of or can imagine ... the Joint Staff of the Department of Defense which spend somewhere between nine and \$11 billion dollars a year on cybersecurity, could not protect the joint staffs own internal network ... CISA [Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency] (www.cisa.gov). They couldn't protect their own networks. They were the they could not detect the solar winds supply chain compromise on their own systems (www.solarwinds.com). ... I want to talk specifically about our voting systems. There's not a computerized voting system in the United States that is certified and in use, that is made entirely in the United States. In fact, most of them are manufactured entirely outside the United States of non US components. And there's no supply chain security on those components. ... The second thing is everything that we've been told about the security of our voting systems being assured by a certification process, and by a testing process by accredited labs under the Election Assistance Commission in the United States. All of those things we've been told are completely false. They are a complete sham.

All of those organizations have reinforced this centralized computerized technocracy and it is depriving Americans control over our elections and therefore over our country. 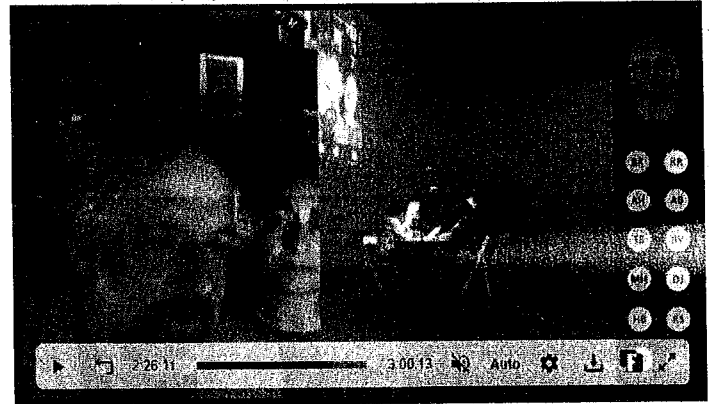

So that's why I spend so much of my time working almost daily with our local teams around the country and you know, I've been working with you guys as well. We need to educate the public we need the public to engage. In fact, I'm already booked February's almost completely full already in their march already. ... So one was that fear of reprisal to the getting political pressure from top and insufficient pressure from the bottom. And the other thing is a lot of clerks I've learned they get they get bonuses, and I don't know if people know this, but for example, when I was in Pennsylvania, they get bonuses based upon the number of people in their registration rolls. So in other words after the election, if it all goes smoothly, they get a bonus. If they find problems, don't get a bonus. And who pays that bonus by the way, you see where I'm going? So in other words, their financial incentives and rewards for them not rocking the boat. Then of course, they believe the lies. So I was just in Wisconsin recently and every clerk I talked to they all said the same thing. I met with many of them the first words out of their mouth is Oh, no doctor think we can't get rid of the machines. It's required by HAVA [Help America Vote Act (of 2002)]. It's required by federal law. No, it's not required by federal law. That's the line they've been told by the people who have a vested interest in keeping the machines in the in the in the precincts. So when you push back and you push back and you push back and you show them the HAVA [Help America Vote Act (of 2002)] laws, and you show them their own statutes, they realize I guess it isn't required by law after all.
