### <u>"Michigan Statewide Mutual Aid Deployment to Menominee"</u>

On October 9<sup>th</sup> a request was made to Michigan MABAS Division 3701, which Leland Township Fire & Rescue is a part of and Chief Besson oversees, for manpower and equipment to help the Menominee Fire Department at the scene of a large warehouse fire.

Firefighter Brandon Morse was deployed, on October 10<sup>th</sup>, along with other local and regional resources to assist Menominee. Brandon spent four days on scene before being cleared for home.

On October 14<sup>th</sup> Fire Chief Besson was deployed as a strike team leader to relieve the original Division 3701 strike team leader. He was released on October 16<sup>th</sup> when a fresh team arrived to help.

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#### **Overlapping Calls**

Overlapping calls are two or more calls occurring at the same time before the Duty Crew can respond to it. For instance, the Duty Crew could be responding to, arriving at, or at the scene of an incident when another call for service comes in. In 2021 we had an overlapping average of about 15.8% (as compared to 11.9% in 2020 and 9% in 2019). In October we had **39** overlapping calls for a total of **56.5%** of our calls. This year our overlapping call average is about **15.6**% (68 of 436).

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#### **Call Staffing:**

This chart provides the duty crew staffing levels for the number of incidents. Our minimum is two (at least one Paramedic). 24 calls involved the response of off-duty/paid-on-call staff.

#### **Miscellaneous Things Involving Our Department:**

- Responded to Menominee as part of a regional strike team request. Firefighter Brandon Morse and Fire Chief Dan Besson spent a week in the UP, combined, assisting local resources in extinguishing the fire or bringing the incident under control. See attached pictures.
- Had a significant wind incident come through the county. On October 18<sup>th</sup> the Leland Township Fire & Rescue responded to 21 calls for service.
- Concluded our application process for our vacant full-time firefighter position. Interview and further testing will take place in November.
- Partnered with the Leland Lodge to provide a "haunted house" experience to the local community. We used to do it at the Leland Fire Station, but the set-up and teardown was too time consuming and found the facility at the Leland Lodge to be a better fit operationally.
- Lieutenant/EMS Coordinator Chase Schelling (part-time) attended and graduated from a state-sponsored EMS Leadership Academy. Way to go Chase!
- Brush 542 was taken in for a GMC Factory Recall for its airbags. The work was completed.
- Spoke with EV+, our ambulance vendor, about the reported backlog of chassis and ordering. Mark Genzink, our salesperson, said that new ambulances are forecasted to take about 36 months from the initial process to delivery. LTFR plans to begin the process of getting approval to go out and "get in line" to begin the process to replace Alpha 591 (purchased in 2016).
- Fire Chief Besson attended a MI-CIMS (Critical Incident Management System) to facilitate his role in the county's Emergency Operation Center – in the event of a large-scale incident in Leelanau County.
- Echo 595 was repaired and returned to service. An insurance claim was made when another LTFR vehicle had backed into it while it was parked. The damage "totaled" a rear passenger door -causing a new door to be purchased and a graphics to be reapplied.


In a 60-hour period we responded to 36 calls – 21 of them on October 18<sup>th</sup>.
