Comments for March 8, 2022 Executive Session

My name is Jay Johnson and I live in Empire Township.

We are now ten months after the County Board of Commissioners, in likely violation of the Michigan Open Meetings Act, passed a partisan resolution to create two new departments without stating any need for those departments. This is, without question, the most fiscally irresponsible action taken by the Board of Commissioners in the nearly seventeen years I have watched your deliberations. The total cost of these new departments approaches a quarter million dollars annually and may well run higher.

What has happened in the last ten months?

(1) The establishment of the finance department resulted in the transfer, and higher pay for the same person who was very capably performing those functions before the new department was established.
